#### EHUM requires ;

1. Final work: a thesis or project
2. 27 hours of coursework, and six credits of project or thesis hours. You may accumulate the six thesis hours any time in the second year.
3. Standard language proficiency for MA candidates
4. Three research methods-focused courses approved by the Director for MS candidates
5. 9 credits among EHUM 6850 *Issues in EH* at least once + EHUM 6105 *EH Writing Seminar* and/or EHUM 6860 *Practices in CEL*

#### EHUM encourages ;

1. Coursework with EHUM-affiliated faculty
2. Graduate seminar courses with graduate students, i.e., 6000-level courses and above
3. Coursework in the College of Humanities or with affiliate faculty
